Fiscal:

We approved a home equity savings account for DS Olivia, by investing an additional 5% of her salary for her use to purchase a home in the future

We approved a budget of \$75,000 to assist churches with building issues they cannot handle themselves. These may be loans or grants depending on circumstances. Policy will be shared at District Assembly

We matched Canastota Discovery Church of the Nazarene's savings for a roof of \$6,000 and loaned \$2,445. The \$2,445 was paid back

We approved \$3000 to be gifted to NMI for Nazarene Mission Scholarships in honor of Ken and Sue Blish

We approved \$5000 to Brooktondale for the beautification of the Tabernacle. We also approved a matching challenge of \$2500 be issued to the district. If raised, the \$2,500 will be given

We approved \$5000 for NYI to have scholarships for Young Adult events

We approved 2 weeks of additional pay for all employees for Christmas bonuses

We approved \$5000 worth of repairs on the district owned parsonage in Wolcott

District Properties Board Report, 2024-2025

This year the District Properties Board did not meet for official work. Pastor AJ Bell was appointed by DS Olivia to fill an open position on the board.

The District Properties board would be happy to consult with your church board on matters that relate to your building. Please don't hesitate to reach out for advice and support.

Please keep the following *Manual* paragraphs in mind:

103. Property. The local church considering the purchase or sale of real estate, the erection of churches or church- related buildings, a major remodeling of either, or leasing real property for any reason, shall submit its proposal to the district superintendent and the District Church Properties Board for their consideration, advice, and approval. No indebtedness, whether involving a mortgage or not, shall be incurred in the purchase of real estate or the erection of buildings or a major remodeling of either, without the written approval of the district superintendent and the District Church Properties Board. The local church shall submit quarterly financial and status reports to this board throughout the construction process. (236-237.5)

236. The District Church Properties Board shall be composed of the district superintendent ex-officio and no fewer than two assigned ministers and two lay members. Members may be elected by the district assembly to serve for a term of four years or until their successors are elected and qualified. The District Advisory Board may serve as the District Church Properties Board upon favorable vote of the district assembly.

- 237. The duties of the District Church Properties Board are:
- 237.1. To advance the cause of constructing church-related buildings within the bounds of the assembly district, in cooperation with the District Advisory Board.
- 237.2. To verify and conserve the titles to local church property.
- 237.3. To consider propositions submitted by local churches relating to the purchase or sale of real estate or the erection of church buildings or parsonages, and to advise them concerning the propositions submitted. (103-104)
- 237.4. To approve or disapprove, in conjunction with the district superintendent, propositions submitted by local churches relative to church building plans and the incurring of indebtedness in the purchase of real estate or the erection of buildings. The Church Properties Board shall normally approve a request to increase indebtedness subject to the following guidelines:
- 1. The local church requesting approval to increase indebtedness paid all financial apportionments in full for the two years preceding the request.
- 2. The amount of total indebtedness will not exceed three times the average of the amount raised for all purposes in each of the preceding three years.
- 3. The details of the planned remodeling or construction shall have been approved by the Church Properties Board.
- 4. The amount of indebtedness and the terms of payment will not jeopardize the spiritual life of the church.

The Church Properties Board may approve requests that do not meet these guidelines only with the approval of the district superintendent and the District Advisory Board. (103-104)

Greetings to Dr. Chambo, DS Metcalf, members, friends, and guests of the Upstate NY District!

This year began with some big changes for District NMI in June, when our long-time Council President Sally Mellinger resigned her position to answer the Lord's calling to focus on specific local missions through her home church at Buffalo First. With that, I'd like to thank and recognize Sally for her faithful decade of service as our District NMI Council President, and for the seeds she has sown on good soil all throughout the Upstate NY NMI family.

I'd also like to thank the District NMI Council for their faithful service during this transitional year. Thank you to Pastor Ken Blish, Pastor Eric Verbovszky, Ray Gould, Meghan Johnson, Pastor Abreana Guthrie, Debra Dunn, Daniel Lee, and Pastor Angela Nielsen. Thank you also to Pastor Janae Meyer, Pastors AJ and Chelsea Fry, and DS Olivia Metcalf for your amazing support of the District NMI Council in so many ways, as we continue to move forward and seek the Lord's vision and will for both the Council itself and for its effectiveness on the Upstate NY District. District NMI is excited for what the Lord is doing across Upstate NY, both what we already see and that which we don't yet. The District NMI Council maintains its commitment to encourage, provide resources, foster partnership and communication, and pray for revival and renewal with and through every church on this District, as we all serve to fulfill NMI's purpose together, both locally and globally.

We also praise God for the active obedience of the local churches across our great District, as you say "Yes!" to the Lord's call in your communities and beyond. Churches across Upstate NY have been partnering with multiple community groups and ministries to distribute items such as Crisis Care Kits, student hygiene products, food, clothing for all ages, gifts for children, and Bibles. You love on local schools with ongoing backpack drives, free breakfast meals, and after school programs. You selflessly support ministries to women and men caught in addictions and traumas. You're running soup kitchens and community movie outreach ministries. You're resettling refugees and the displaced. You're ministering to the deaf community in your neighborhoods. You build schools, churches, and hospitals through Alabaster. You share the Gospel with young and old through Child Sponsorship, Jesus Film Harvest Partners, and the World Evangelism Fund (WEF). You gave nearly \$46,000 over our District WEF goal, making Upstate NY a World Evangelism District of Excellence again! The list goes on.

Upstate NY District, you assembled and sent 80 boxes of Crisis Care Kits to Fawn Grove in November for immediate distribution to disaster relief areas! You sent teams from your churches down to Georgia, North Carolina, and Tennessee to aid in hands-on Hurricane Helene recovery efforts. Churches generously provided financial support to the LA District in response to the devastating wildfires. Churches also aided in clean-up, disaster response, and spiritual care to hurting Upstate NY neighbors who were affected by tornados throughout the summer.

Because we care so deeply for those suffering around us, District NMI remains committed to the goal of establishing a Crisis Care Kit Collection Site at one church in every Mission Area on our District, where we can maintain a supply of Crisis Care Kits at the ready for immediate response to disasters and needs, both near and far. Thank you to Sanborn First, Owego, Christ Community, and Keeseville Good Shepherd for serving in this capacity already. We're almost to our goal! Praise the Lord!

In August 2024, the District NMI Council also awarded freshman Ella Lancy with a \$500 NMI Academic Scholarship, as she pursues a Physician's Assistant degree at Daemen University, with the intention to someday serve in medical missions. In the NMI section on the Nazarene.org website, it says this: "We are one people: Nazarene Missions International is people praying, giving,

building, and engaging all ages with the good news of Jesus." Upstate NY District, this is who we are - the hands and feet of Jesus to our communities and across the globe!

As a District NMI family, we do well to care for and connect with our LINKS missionaries. Over the summer, several churches hosted Howie Shute, while he spent time at his camp in the North Central Mission Area, and heard from his missionary time in the Horn of Africa. In September, we welcomed Gary and Penney Sidle on Deputation, as they retire from the Zambia field. We were blessed by their report from their many years in ministry, as well as encouraged and challenged to remember that "With God, all things are possible." They were blessed by your congregations as well. So thank you. We look forward to hosting our 2024 LINKS missionaries, Monte and Bethany Cyr, when they come for a Deputation tour from August 13-25. Thank you to all of the churches who plan to host them! They too look forward to their visit and are grateful for the support and prayers we provided them in 2024. Our 2025 LINKS missionaries are Milly and Agnes Ibanda, a Congolese couple and their five children, serving in Madagascar, East Africa. They both attended and taught at Africa Nazarene University (ANU), as well as other Nazarene Theological institutions in Africa. We are excited to build a relationship with them this year!

In continuing our partnership with ANU, District NMI purchased \$2,000 in tools and supplies for them, and sent it all with a Nazarene Missions Team from the New England District who went there in February 2025. These much-needed tools, not easily obtainable in Kenya, will allow future teams, missionaries, and the local volunteers serving at ANU to effectively and efficiently complete building, maintenance, and renovation tasks as needed.

From September 19-28, 2025, we're sending a Nazarene Missions Team of 22 amazing people to Guatemala, to Barrio La Florida in San Luis (northern Peten region) to construct a large covered shelter, as part of a bigger project to expand and upgrade the Nazarene church there. They will also engage in personal evangelism and VBS with local missionaries. The construction project costs \$10,000, and the District NMI Council asks everyone to prayerfully consider contributing to the project fund. Upstate NY District, let's do this and send them well! See Pastor Eric Verbovszky, the Nazarene Missions Team Coordinator, for information about how to give! Please pray for this team, as they prepare over the next several months, to be the hands and feet of Jesus in Guatemala.

To close out the year, several Upstate NY District folks attended the USA/Canada Region evangelism M25 Conference in Kansas City, MO from February 10-12. This year's focus is "Bringing People to Jesus," the third stage of the "Cycle of Resurgence," USA/Canada's current multiyear focus plan. This includes praying for 65,000 new followers of Christ and for a return to our roots when there was an active and impactful Church of the Nazarene in every county across the United States and Canada! Just imagine what that would look like in Upstate NY today! God can and wants to raise the dry bones back to life in places that *may seem* dead. He wants to send us to those familiar places and people in our lives and to the unfamiliar – and work through us to make it happen. Stan Reeder, USA/Canada's Regional Director, exhorted the assembly during the first plenary session of the conference with this: "The Gospel will never fail. The Gospel can't fail. The Gospel must not fail. Help us find our [the Church] identity in a heart for lost people." Lord Jesus, we want to be agents in this revival that is coming! We say, "Yes! Send us!" Amen!

2024-2025 Upstate District NDI President's Report

Greetings to Dr. Chambo, Dr. Metcalf, friends and family members of the Body of Christ in the Upstate New York District!

It's a privilege to report to you on this past year of our efforts as a district in the area of Discipleship. It has been a year of trial and error as I have learned a lot about this position as well as the overall state of discipleship across the District. I have been blessed with a great team of people who are passionate about discipleship and serving the church. I would like to thank the Pastors on the NDI board, Nate Patnode, Abreana Guthrie, Polly Carman, Janae Meyer, and Emily McCulla as well as the lay leaders, Gloria Lanning, Marilyn Dominick, Tim Schmitt, and Kent McCroskey. They have been very helpful, gracious, and patient with my transition to this position.

Over the past year, we took a step back to reflect on what discipleship looks like at the district level and how we, as the NDI board, can better support local churches in this area. We scaled back certain efforts while launching new initiatives, aiming for greater impact. Additionally, we increased our financial support for several ongoing projects we deemed worthy of further investment. To sharpen our focus on the why behind our mission, we walked through Tim Soerens' book, *Everywhere You Look*, as a team.

The following paragraphs highlight some of the key moments and accomplishments from this past year.

Under the leadership and guidance of Pastor Elizabeth Criscuolo, we sought to expand our efforts through the Peace Initiative. By strategically working together through restorative circles, strengthening communication skills, and finding creative approaches to reconciliation and resolution, our goal is to build stronger communities while promoting and maintaining healthy churches.

Pastor Liz, in collaboration with Moira Osario from ACCORD, led a virtual workshop to introduce some of our pastors and leaders to the benefits of restorative circles. The webinar was impactful, opening attendees' eyes to new methods of conflict resolution. However, subsequent training sessions saw lower attendance, likely due to widespread fatigue with virtual meetings.

Moving forward, we plan to prioritize more in-person gatherings tailored to the specific needs of our communities, fostering deeper engagement and collaboration.

Recognizing a general lack of male involvement in the church, we made it a priority to focus on engaging men in ministry. Tim Schmitt, who has a deep passion for this work and has witnessed God move powerfully through intentional men's ministries in his local context, led us through a workshop on this topic.

The session covered practical steps for initiating conversations with local contacts and building strong, lasting relationships. Participants also shared tips and personal experiences of how they had seen God at work through men's ministries in their own settings.

The training was well received, and we are hopeful that it will serve as a foundation for expanding our efforts—discipling more men and encouraging greater involvement in the local church.

Pastor Leslie Davies led another successful Children's Camp this past year. With the support of Big Blast Ministries, they witnessed God move powerfully through both children and their parents. The camp welcomed 16 kids and 12 parents/guardians—matching the attendance from the previous year. However, this time they added an extra night, which everyone agreed was the perfect amount of time.

Families enjoyed a variety of activities, including free snow cones, a bounce house, basketball, chalk, bubbles, and outdoor games. The Olympic Games and *Water Fun Wednesday* were standout highlights, featuring the Water Monster, a wet bounce house, a slip-and-slide, and a whopping 600 water balloons.

The evening activities were especially memorable. Kids raved about the epic experiences, which included a movie night with free popcorn and Twizzlers, a glow-in-the-dark dance party (which was, of course, *legendary*), and a massive bonfire with s'mores. During the fireside time, children and parents shared their favorite moments of the week and reflected on their closest encounters with Jesus. This time of sharing was deeply meaningful, as many spoke of how they had seen God move in their hearts and lives throughout the week.

As Pastor Leslie put it: "The fun is great—it gets them there. But then they come, and Jesus changes lives. Jesus strengthens families. Jesus heals and mends broken relationships. Jesus moves!"

And *that* is why we do what we do.

I feel like God is going to do great things in this district in the coming years. It may not be easy and it may take some time, but I feel like if we're willing to open our eyes we will see where God's Kingdom is at work and how to jump in on the action.

Thank you for giving me the opportunity to serve in this capacity. I look forward to serving the district and the local churches better in the future.

Grace to you and peace from God our Creator and the Lord Jesus Christ.

First and foremost, I would like to thank Dr. Chambo, Dr. Metcalf, and the entire Upstate District for the privilege of serving this past year as the District NYI President. The fact that you have entrusted me with stewarding a ministry that shapes and supports our teens and young adults is a responsibility I do not hold lightly. However, I would be remiss if I did not take the opportunity to also thank the parents, teenagers, and young adults that make this ministry worthwhile. The countless volunteers, council members, and event coordinators that do the work are the real reason this ministry is possible. If not clear, I am incredibly humbled that I get the chance to work with and for this incredible ministry. Thank you.

This past year was my first and, wowzer, it was a learning curve! In March, I got the chance to go to Salt Lake City, Utah for the annual NYI leadership conference. That was where I met the majority of our field NYI leaders. It was so encouraging to hear that the first year is always a confusing one. They offered wise advice and encouragement for the future.

As far as our teens this past year, a story is necessary to understand what God is up to. Teen camp was wet. In case you have forgotten, we had a tropical storm sitting on us the entire week. Our leaders and teens did the best they could to adjust for the unexpected downpours but it was shaping up to be a less than memorable experience, until God moved. Every night, our speakers left the altars open. While there was no formal altar call, the teens clearly wanted to spend more time working on their lives with God. We have heard stories of students working through pretty hard situations or choices. The altars were packed and by the end of the week, as we sat around a makeshift campfire, they told stories of how they had experienced God in new ways. Confessions, callings, and life transformation were the result of that week.

That story would be good enough if it ended there, but it doesn't. Fast forward, we have had reports all across the district of congregations being transformed from the testimonies of these teenagers! Reports of entire families deciding to follow Christ, student-led Bible studies, new youth groups, students who felt like outsiders being invited into the community. These stories are just a small portion of what God is doing on our district through our teenagers. We continue to pray for more of their lives to be transformed into the likeness of Christ. May they seek the Kingdom first in all they do.

Our young adult ministry on the district is getting a reboot. Statistically, this group is leaving the Church across denominations. However, the people I have encountered are hungry for belonging and community. My hope and desire is that we are able to create a space on the Upstate district that helps to foster just that. Then, working with local congregations, the hope is that young adults would get plugged into an even larger family. This past year saw the return of the young adult retreat which was a success after being off the calendar for several years. We heard comments that it was nice to have a place to remember old stories and connect with old friends. For the future, we are hoping to host two events a year in the winter and summer. Ideally we would have meet ups around the district at different times just to be reminded that we aren't alone.

Lastly, my heart is yearning for a network of youth workers on the district. As I have tried to plug in this past year, I have found it difficult to know "who" are the ones discipling our teens and young adults. I attempted to start a network call once a quarter but fell short because of my overwhelmed schedule. This next year, I am hopeful that this will get off the ground. Ministry can feel lonely and isolating; we are better when we work together!

I am hopeful for what the Lord is doing and going to do on the Upstate New York District. I am praying for unity as we serve our teens, young adults, and their families. I am praying for God's righteousness to be the desire of our young people's hearts. I am praying for a district that recognizes a need for teenagers in their congregations and is committed to getting their hands dirty. Most of all, I am praying that we are known as a district that loves our teens and young adults in whatever life stage they find themselves. May they know the Kingdom of God because we have been obedient to loving them well throughout their lives!

Director of Chaplain Ministries

This year I was able to begin supporting those within our district that are either assigned chaplains, or exploring chaplain ministries. We met via zoom for introductions and then communicated via email supporting each other during the year. Historically, our denominational headquarters has supported our chaplains through the provision of resources, networking and mentoring. In 2008, several changes were made, prompting districts to navigate many of what had been centralized responsibilities. Recently, initiatives have been explored and Global Clergy development created an executive committee that is designing a system to provide mutual resourcing, support, networking and mentoring. I have been appointed to this executive committee and most recently elected as co-chair. This March we met in Chicago for the first time in person. We worked diligently for the Church of the Nazarene, for she is wonderful. I am excited for what is to come. This work and the supports offered are foundational to what I hope to continue to offer as the district chaplain director as well.

Attached you will find the reports of two of our Upstate NY District assigned chaplains. It is important that you hear their stories. I would also like to share with you my own. As the Director of Spiritual Care at UR Thompson Hospital I have the great privilege of companioning and shepherding patients and staff. Staff care is a primary focus for me and I have developed deep relationships with many in the hospital. They share their daily lives with me.. They, like you, have needs and include a variety of things including caring for aging parents, navigating illness, financial stressors or celebrating their child's milestones. I enjoy seeing pictures from ball games and being invited into their lives and events. It is a gift. Patient care is also part of my ministry at UR Thompson. I often say that the management part of my job has my head, but the bedside will always have my heart. My interfaith work is grounded in the firm beliefs of our Wesleyan Holiness tradition and God's wonderful and mysterious prevenient grace. All people are beloved and belong. As a professional chaplain I am trained in trauma informed care. I work closely with the palliative care physicians and serve on the hospital ethics committee. I facilitate critical incident debriefs, staff "circles of care" and grief groups. Religious rituals, sacraments and traditions are also part of my work, whether it be a wedding, an Ash Wednesday or Good Friday service, the Blessing of Hands or funerals, I am called upon to pastor. As the department has grown, we have added new staff and I have been moved from Manager to Director. This is offered points of vocational growth. As well as my board certification received from the Association of Professional chaplains. This is a culmination of years of work and demonstration of specific and detailed competencies. This year has been a delight and I look forward to how God will continue to move in and through me to others. My prayer is that Christ is seen in me, and in that, people know they are beloved and belong to Him.

During the 2024-2025 church year, I had the honor and privilege of serving as Chaplain to Soldiers of 3rd Brigade, 98th Training Division. The brigade is comprised of Army Reserve Drill Sergeants and consists of 3 Battalions located throughout the northeast, from Maryland to Maine. Ministry conducted throughout the year involved regular chapel services, pastoral care and counseling, and ensuring every Soldiers' constitutional right to the free exercise of their religion. Additionally, I advised command teams on issues of ethics, morals, morale, and religion. Additional ministry included the following:

- 9 "Words of the Day," challenging and inspiring Soldiers
- 14 counseling sessions on topics ranging from relationships, grief, death, family, suicide, work, stress, life, to health
- 9 Chapel services
- Invocation and benediction at 3 Change of Command military ceremonies
- A visit to Gettysburg National Military Park where I gave a report to fellow Soldiers on Chaplain William Corby, Union Chaplain during the Civil War

- Coordinating spiritual readiness training for mobilizing units
- Honoring fallen Soldiers through remembrance ceremony planning and coordination
- · Coordinated for another Chaplain to provide pastoral care for Soldiers when I was not able to be present
- Attended the "Army Reserve Battle Focused Training" professional development week where Chaplains from all over the country focused on how to best provide ministry during combat operations
- Traveled to Ft. Indiantown Gap, PA in July 2024 with Soldiers doing valuable ministry of presence, challenging and encouraging individuals
- Attended M25 with fellow Nazarene military Chaplains as we looked at how we apply the gospel to a
 military context

Overall, this ministry continues to shape me as much as I pray it shapes the Soldiers I interact with. I continue to plant seeds through both words and actions that demonstrate the love of Christ. Soldiers have expressed that they are challenged to read scripture, allow God to shape how they live, treat others with dignity and respect, and have a positive and hopeful outlook. I pray that the Holy Spirit will continue to use me to impact people in small and large ways as I continue this ministry.

Military Chaplaincy is a calling unlike any other. A year ago, I was parachuting from a plane with hundreds from my "congregation" into the arctic air and living in -80 degree weather for weeks as part of an annual exercise. Shortly after, I moved my family from Alaska to North Carolina and began a new assignment. Deploying with this team found me in a place with incredible historic significance. I had the joy of baptizing 18 people in the river where Jesus was baptized, then leading a moral leadership discussion at the place where King David had Uriah killed.

Of course, it wasn't all fun and adventure. There were also moments of hurt as well. I sat with people who were detoxing from alcohol addiction, those with career ending injuries, marriages struggling to survive and those that were calling it quits. That is the job of a military chaplain, to be where the people are. Look when others look away, stand next to someone when everyone else has left. We call it muddy boots ministry – a chaplain goes with and to the congregation. Our charge is to bring Soldiers to God and God to Soldiers.

Serving in the on-post chapel has provided opportunities to preach the Gospel and the call to holiness. I serve as the preaching lead and develop the sermon series' and guide other chaplains as they craft their messages. This is a critical role in this environment since the pulpit is shared by several chaplains due to frequent travel and exercises causing absences. This provides good continuity of care for the congregants.

Some of the larger initiatives this year have included marriage enrichment workshops, ethical decision-making seminars, moral resiliency, spiritual and family life enhancement, support to deployed troops, and personal resiliency training. Advising the command teams on matters that affect the mission are also a huge part of chaplaincy. This helps to create a culture within the organization that enables our work and brings satisfaction to life.

The support of the Church of the Nazarene ensures that chaplains are cared for through our endorsing agent, much the way pastors are by their District Superintendents. Continuing education ensures we are abreast of newest practices in pastoral care and counseling. The churches bylaws provide excellent guidance for the support we can provide. The Nazarene military chaplains have an excellent reputation across the force, and we greatly appreciate the prayers, support and encouragement from our sending churches and the denomination at large.

District Finance Committee Report

We, your Assembly Finance Committee, submit the following recommendations:

Explanation of Calculation of Funds

- 1. That the latest Fund Formula of the General Board and Board of General Superintendents be followed. We should prayerfully plan for and promote 100% payment of every Fund.
 - a. The World Evangelism Fund will be 5.5% of total monies raised based on the current year's income, less approved Mission Specials.
 - b. The Eastern Field Education Fund will be 2.5% of total monies raised based on the current year's income, less WEF/approved Mission Specials.
 - c. Nazarene Benefits, USA, will be 2.00% of total monies raised based on the current year's income, less WEF/approved Mission Specials.
 - d. The District Fund will be 6.75% of total monies raised based on the current year's income, less WEF/approved Mission Specials. This includes the auxiliary budgets and the Brooktondale Camp and Retreat Center.

All funds should be sent to the District for disbursement to the appropriate funds—Upstate New York District, PO Box 573 Henrietta, NY 14467. Each treasurer will send with the check a copy of the chart provided at the end of this document to help the district know the breakdown of the monies for each allocation.

Local

- 2. That each church be encouraged in the stewardship of its possession as this is related to wills and estate gifts on behalf of continuing generosity to the ministry of the local church. Further resources are available through the stewardship ministry of the general church to guide members of each congregation.
- 3. That any church seeking to acquire a new mortgage, or refinance an existing mortgage must have written approval from the District Superintendent and the District Properties Board per *Manual* 103.
- 4. That each local church provides Medical/Hospitalization Insurance coverage and Long-term Disability Insurance for their pastor and family, and staff. Each church is to consider including a Dental allowance as part of the benefits. We would caution pastors and churches in making unresearched changes in health insurance coverage for the parsonage family, based solely on premium cost, without comparison of coverage. Each local church should attempt to assume payment of its pastor's portion of this cost. If any situation develops threatening to cause cancellation of coverage, the district office is to be notified.
- 5. All churches must submit a written request for the continuance of staff every year through the District Superintendent. Approval from the DS is guided as it relates to the local church to meet all obligations..
- 6. A congregation should only request approval to go into debt or refinancing for any building or capital improvements when it has shown its ability and willingness to pay all of its allocations in full, in harmony with the *Manual* of the Church of the Nazarene. (Further reference: *Manual* Para. 103, 104, 159-159.8, 211.13, 237)

- 7. That churches and church-type missions receiving district support may not increase expenditures for buildings, equipment, vehicles, annual salaries, or purchases of any single item amounting to more than five percent of their annual income without the written approval of the District Superintendent and the District Advisory Board. Furthermore, all local churches that are supported financially by the District shall submit their financial report to the District Treasurer every quarter, as well as an annual budget, which shall be submitted by March 1 of each year. Churches receiving district support must have a budget that is reviewed annually, make allocation payments to the district, and strive to meet all other allocations.
- 8. That, realizing the importance of the World Evangelism Fund, our churches do not undertake missions or Work and Witness trips until adequate plans have been implemented to assure the full payment of their World Evangelism allocation, which is the lifeline of the Global Mission program.
- 9. That each church board adopt an annual budget for use as a tool in monitoring its finances every month. (*Manual* Para. 129.6, 129.7) Each local church treasurer and/or auxiliary treasurer is to submit an itemized financial report to the monthly meeting of the local church board, and these reports are to be posted every month for the church to review. All bank and investment statements should be provided to the church board upon request. The financial records should be reviewed annually by the finance committee. (*Manual* Para. 129.21, 129.22) The district treasurer stands ready with counsel or advice upon request. In addition, we recommend that each church have its books reviewed by an outside auditing firm at least every three years. (*Manual* Para. 129.23)
- 10. That each local church should make an annual contribution to the Nazarene Bible College and the Nazarene Theological Seminary.
- 11. A church Treasurer and Pastor can access up-to-date reports of their budget allocations on the Church of the Nazarene's Funding the Mission portal found at https://fundingthemission.org. If access needs to be gained, reach out to the district office.

District

- 1. That the District Superintendent be granted five weeks' vacation with pay to be taken at his/her discretion.
- 2. That the District Advisory Board evaluate the District Superintendent's need for a plan to provide a period of rest, renewal, and study; and that such a plan would be mutually agreed upon so that it would benefit both the District Superintendent and the District about short and long term of their ministry objectives, and that financial arrangements for that period be mutually agreed upon. The District Advisory Board shall evaluate this plan during the 5- year of the District Superintendent's tenure to be taken no later than the 7- year of his/her tenure.
- 3. That district personnel, such as members of district boards and committees, be reimbursed at their request at the rate of \$.50 per mile while traveling on district business, unless otherwise agreed upon.
- 4. That the District Superintendent, District Advisory Board, District Secretary, District Treasurer, and other such personnel as may be designated by the District Superintendent, who are not sent by their local church as a delegate, be granted partial assistance for expenses at the

- District Assembly and that these be determined by the District Advisory Board before the District Assembly.
- 5. That the District Treasurer has the books reviewed within 90 days from the close of the District Assembly by a public accountant every year. The District Treasurer presents a certificate of review to the District Advisory Board, and the District Treasurer confers with the newly elected auxiliary treasurers concerning bookkeeping procedures.
- 6. That all money received from the sale of properties of disorganized churches, less encumbrances and costs will be received by the District Advisory Board for the Missional Initiative fund.

Ministerial Support

The New Testament church recognized that the persons called to be pastors, associates, evangelists, and teachers should make that ministry their primary task and should give themselves to it fully. The local church will honor God with the determined and faithful financial support of the God-called minister!

We recommend the following:

Pastor's Cash Salary

- A. That each church endeavors to employ its pastor on a full-time basis. Churches with a bi-vocational pastor should review the circumstances that result in the need to supplement pastoral income as an opportunity to plan for the future growth of the church, including the goal of increased pastoral support to better enable the pastor to attend to the work of ministry in keeping with this sacred calling. Recognizing that some churches may be best served by a bi-vocational pastor, each should annually review steps to ensure the best care of their pastor as possible, coupled with the worthy goal of full support.
- B. That the church board of trustees and/or the finance committee initiate a salary review at least annually, within the budgetary process, and grant cost-of-living adjustments and cash salary adjustments in accordance with the spiritual and relational climate of the church.

Pastoral Benefits

- A. That each church reimburse all full-time pastors and associate(s) for their social security tax, with payments being made at least quarterly or proportionately with each salary check.
- B. That each church having a pastor and an associate or other paid staff shall provide worker's compensation and short-term disability coverage.
- C. That no pastor/full-time associate family be without health insurance and that the premiums are paid by the church unless satisfactory arrangements are made.
- D. That, when an active pastor or full-time associate becomes seriously ill, the church grants them a sick leave with full pay up to 90 days. If the illness continues longer, the termination of the leave is to be determined by the local church board in consultation with the district superintendent.
- E. That each church provides for all full-time pastors and associate(s) housing and utilities (including internet and phone expenses), except personal long-distance phone calls.
- F. That, since home equity cannot be earned by a pastor living in a church-owned parsonage, each church makes provision to offset this amount by investing an additional 5 percent above the pastor's salary in the pastor's name, toward the

- purchase of a home at retirement. Where possible, the above home equity is provided for full-time associate(s) as well.
- G. That all churches give full support to Nazarene Benefits USA, which benefits the pastor, full-time associate, retired pastors, and widowed spouses. In addition, the local church boards are encouraged to consider additional contributions to the pastor's TSA.
- H. That all pastors and full-time associates of the church, for personal renewal, be granted paid vacations according to the following guidelines: (time devoted to district functions and denominational meetings should not be considered vacation time).
 - At least three weeks for pastors and full-time associates serving the denomination for 1 to 10 years.
 - At least four weeks for pastors and full-time associates serving the denomination for 11 to 15
 - Five weeks for pastors and full-time associates serving the denomination beyond 15 years.
- I. That each church considers a 5 percent tax-sheltered annuity for the full-time pastor and full-time associate(s) inasmuch as the retirement plan of Nazarene Benefits USA has thus recommended.
- J. That each church encourages the pastor and full-time associate(s) to enrich their ministerial training by providing funds and time for continuing education. This may include ministerial conventions, seminars, directed studies, special college and seminary courses, the purchase of professional development materials, and the payment of professional dues.
- K. That each local church pays the moving expenses of the incoming pastor and full-time associate(s). New IRS rules make moving expenses income, please be sure to plan accordingly.
- L. That each church give special consideration to their pastoral staff and families at Christmas and other appropriate times. We encourage a minimum of at least a week's salary to be given to them through love offering or the local church budget.
- M. That each church consider providing supplemental insurance for the pastor and/or associate(s). The District will provide one-time financial support for AFLAC, the district policy, to offset the cost of enrollment based on church size. Contact the district office for more information.
- N. Affirming the value of family and the importance of pastors modeling peaceful and integrated lives, local churches should consider providing maternity or paternity leave for their pastors and associates. Such a policy may contain the following provisions:
 - Timing and duration of maternity or paternity leave should be determined by the mutual agreement of the pastor and church board prior to anticipated childbirth or adoption placement.
 - Maternity or paternity leave should be considered in addition to and separately from vacation.
 - The local church should consult with the pastor and District Superintendent to arrange for a supply pastor during the period of maternity or paternity leave.
 - During maternity or paternity leave, the pastor's full salary and benefits continue. Any other arrangement shall be placed in writing and signed by the pastor, secretary of the church board, and the District Superintendent.

Schedule A

A Pastor's Cash salary is defined by:

- Cash Compensation
- Employer Tax-Sheltered Annuity contribution

Schedule B

The following are costs of ministry expenses and should not be considered as a part of the Pastor's cash salary: Social Security Reimbursement, Worker's Compensation, Housing, Utilities, Travel Allowance, Entertainment Expenses, Continuing Education expenses, Insurance (Health, Long-Term Disability, Life, Dental, Disability)

Reimbursement for Local Church Expenses

- A. That each church is encouraged to pay the travel expenses for the pastor and fulltime associate pastor(s) while on official church business at the approved IRS mileage allowance.
- B. That each church provide travel, food, and lodging expenses for each pastor and full-time associate pastor attending official district meetings when such expenses are not paid by the district.
- C. That each church reimburse the pastor and full-time associate pastor for any expenses involved in the entertainment of church guests, such as evangelists, missionaries, special speakers, and other persons with whom they are working on church business as directed by the church board.
- D. That each church provides a comfortable and well-equipped office/study for the pastor and full-time associate pastor(s). This provision should include supplies, postage, telephone, computer, and secretarial help when needed.
- E. We recommend that church boards review staff compensation packages annually, as part of the church budget process prior to the start of each new church year.

Remuneration and Benefits for Evangelists

- A. That full-time evangelist's remuneration should be equal to an amount equal to twice the pastor's salary for the number of Sundays of the meeting. He/She should be reimbursed for their travel expenses and receive proportional reimbursement for Social Security. The amount of the remuneration should be communicated to the evangelist before the meeting.
- B. That each full-time evangelist called by the local church be remembered at Christmas with a cash gift.

Pulpit-Supply Pastors

- A. That each local church sets remuneration for pulpit supply pastors based on mileage distance and the number of services held. A minimum of \$150, plus mileage, should be paid for pulpit supply
- B. That each local church take into consideration a hospitable provision of meals and a resting place when the pulpit supply pastor is staying for more than one service, or has a long distance to return home after the service.

Other Recommendations

- A. That our churches remember the retired ministers, missionaries, and evangelists within their membership with special and appropriate acts of love and kindness.
- B. That each church board review the recommendations of this committee annually; and that the district office send a copy of this report to each local church board secretary, treasurer and pastor for their review.
- C. Out of a deep concern that our pastors avoid stress and burnout and maintain a clear continuing vision for their church, we make the following recommendations:
 - a. That every pastor and full-time associate takes one day of rest every seven days. The congregation should make every effort possible to see that this day is free of unnecessary interruptions.
 - b. That the church board and the pastor bi-annually evaluate the pastor's need for a plan to provide a period of rest, renewal and study; and that such a plan would be mutually agreed upon so that it would benefit both the pastor and the church with regard to short and long term of their ministry objectives, and that financial arrangements for that period of time be mutually agreed upon. The church board shall evaluate this plan during the 3rd year of the pastor's tenure to be implemented no later than the 5th year of his/her tenure.
 - c. That, if the pastor and the church board find it difficult to have a prolonged period for the pastor to have rest, reflection, and renewal, they give consideration to providing one week for this purpose every seventh month in addition to the regular vacation time, possibly taken at the Brooktondale Nazarene Camp and Retreat Center.
 - d. That each church set aside weekly an amount established by the church board for expenses of its pastoral staff and spouse(s) to attend PALCON and other general church conferences including General Assembly, such time to be considered in addition to vacation time.

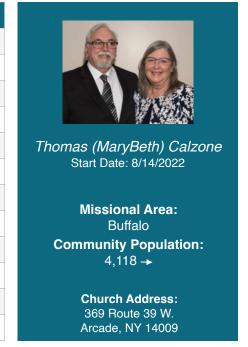

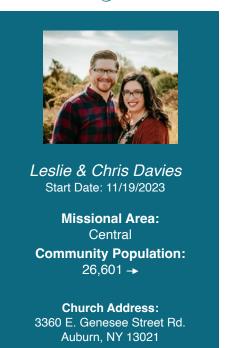
I want to leave all with this passage from Psalm 133:

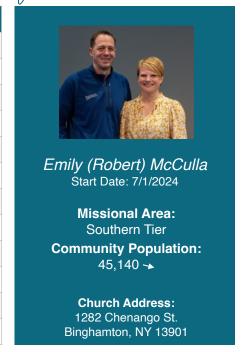

Buffalo First is a small but mighty little church sitting in the heart of Buffalo New York on Kenmore ave. God has used this little church in the past year to bring light and hope to the surrounding Buffalo community in ways we continue to be amazed by.

Buffalo First continues the effort of helping meet the expressed needs of our community members through a mobile food pantry ministry that is going strong. Last year Buffalo First embraced the invitation to be the hands and feet of Jesus and participated in serving over 3000 individuals with fresh food. We use this opportunity to further reach out and invite those clients with personal invitations—to attend a monthly community dinner hosted by the church and sponsored by the food pantry.

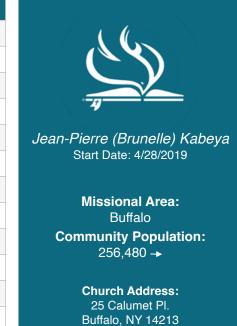
With refugees who did not have cooking facilities in mind, we considered how they were possibly unfamiliar with American cuisine, they didn't have facilities to cook with, so we devised our strategy around meeting this need. Our goal was to have non-churched food pantry individuals come, prepare a meal together, eat together, get new recipe ideas, and fellowship while we built relationship. Although the intention of reaching refugees seems to be a disappearing vision, through this community dinner effort, several new opportunities have been presented. We are attempting to be faithful to journey obediently wherever it is that God intends for us to go. As a result of community dinners, several church members have in turn been invited into unique and unlikely spaces from attendees that responded to community dinner invitations. These places of invitation are where these community members live, gather and find meaning. Buffalo First is accepting the invitation while we are diligently praying that God is in, and through, above, beneath, and surrounding these efforts. We continually submit to being the presence of Christ in places we normally would not find ourselves- even scary places.

Pastor Ramona is so humbled, awed and overwhelmed at the opportunities to live life with this precious group of people who are willing to take risks and love others. Pastor Ramona admits that, to have a calling where one can work alongside, minister too, gain strength from, and be supported and encouraged by the church family at Buffalo First- it is an awesome honor- there is no greater calling.

Finally, it is with joy, anticipation (and some sorrow) that Pastor Ramona anticipates the end of her educational endeavors at NTS. The end of this chapter holds anticipation of having more time in general, more investment time for these efforts and in kingdom building in the Buffalo area.

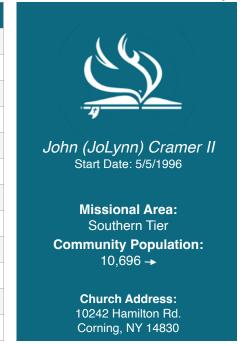

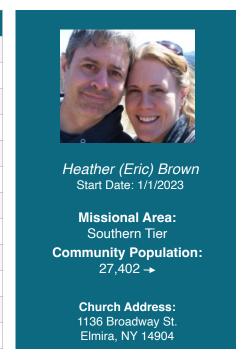

As I reflect over the last year, I am filled with gratitude for the progress we've made. While there have been challenges and changes along the way, God's faithfulness has remained constant, guiding us in the right direction. The following are a few of highlights that we celebrate and for which we give God thanks.

Discipleship — This year, we launched a youth group! Three additional leaders joined our initial leader, and the program, starting as a summer initiative, continued through the school year due to the youth's enthusiasm. Weekly attendance has grown from 7 to 12, with fellowship, games, Bible lessons, and special events. The youth leaders meet weekly via Zoom to pray for the youth, and we're currently converting a resource room into a dedicated youth space.

Our Sunday Morning Worship services and Tuesday bible study continue to be times of positive discipleship in reading, reflecting and learning from God's Word. We have been challenged to apply its teachings to our lives and to follow Jesus more faithfully. In February, we began the Alpha Video Series (10 sessions) on Thursday evenings, further expanding our outreach and discipleship efforts. Thanks to Pastor Polly Carman for leading us in this endeavor.

Global & Local Missions — Our church participated in Alabaster fund collections in February and September, assembled and donated Crisis care kits to Fawn Grove, and also contributed gift boxes to Operation Christmas Child. We provided Christmas gifts to the Character Ed Student and to a pre-school class at a local day care.

We partnered with the Character Education Development to assist with one hour of weekly religious education for students at Broadway Elementary School, grades 3-6. The children are excited to memorize Bible verses and learn about Jesus.

Two workers from the BOCES job training program have been assisting us weekly, contributing to cleaning, repairs, and organizing for our church and clothing ministry. Their help has been invaluable.

Our Community Clothing closet, open on Wednesdays, offered free clothing to 2,067 individuals (781 family units). The local news station did an evening news highlight on our "Blessing Boutique." We continue to support other local agencies in meeting their clients' needs. The clothing ministry has been a great resource for community involvement and connections.

At a local Soup Kitchen we prepared and served one meal per month, providing 1,006 of the 17,254 meals served this year.

Vision & Mission — We are blessed to be working with Vision Partners. With their help, our vision team of six has worked to discern and name our core values, craft a mission statement and set goals to ensure we stay focused on Christ's calling for us.

Our Values: Jesus Comes First; Gather in Worship; Guided by Prayer; Concerned with others' needs (spiritual, physical, mental, emotional); Sharing Hope: Knowing Christ makes a difference

Our Mission: SERVING ALL PEOPLE WITH THE HOPE OF CHRIST

Gratitude for our Congregation — I am so grateful for each individual who actively contributes to our church. From worship leaders to those caring for our facilities, teaching Bible studies, and supporting various ministries, your dedication is propelling us forward in unity and faith.

Looking Ahead — As we continue to progress, we will focus on revitalizing our facilities and connecting more with our community. As we remain committed to prayer and to being obedient to God's call, I believe that we will continue to move forward in fulfilling His purposes for us. May 2025 be a year where we are amazed at what God will do for and through His church. To God be the glory!

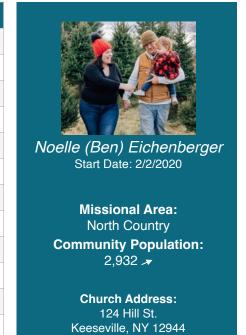

What a year it has been for Keeseville Church! This year our church continued to step out in faith and trusting God to provide in big ways. The year began with a few major repairs and needed capital improvements. We are grateful that these were able to be taken care out of savings and continue to look for ways to invest in and be good stewards of our beautiful property, especially as we continue to open our space up to the community.

Outreach ministry and growing community partnerships were a big focus this year. We have partnered with several community organizations including the Ausable Valley Grange for a community clean-up and blood drive; the Keeseville Library in providing hygiene products to community members; the town of Chesterfield in planning and volunteering for the Keeseville Holiday Celebration; Cornell Cooperative Extension of Clinton County for a food preservation class; Birthright of Plattsburgh to provide diapers, formula, wipes and other baby products to young families; NAMI to provide laundry soap, quarters, winter gear and hygiene products to those dealing with housing insecurity, Clinton County JCEO to provide food and dry goods to north country families and the Essex Food Hub in providing local food to families who need it. We have also helped several local families with groceries, gas, utility bills, and car repairs and hosted our first community Thanksgiving meal and Christmas Eve dinner.

Our church celebrated Easter with a baptism and a baby dedication and has felt a hunger to draw closer to God through Bible Study, serving the community and prayer. More than ever, we have dug into what God's Word actually says, walking through 1 John in a sermon series, preaching through each of the Minor Prophets, a verse by verse Bible Study through the Book of Mark and more. Pastor Josh continues to lead our children's ministry and help our children learn more about Jesus. We have also taken time to learn about the importance of personal spiritual formation and how to better love our neighbor through book club discussions, small group studies and sermon series.

One of the most exciting things that took place this year was the official opening of the Keeseville Hope Kitchen. As I write this report, we have served almost 1600 meals since beginning our weekly suppers in November 2024. We have also been able to offer canning and bread baking classes and, because of one of our partnerships, provided locally grown food to several families in the North Country. Two volunteers deliver 20-25 meals to the retirement home down the street each week.

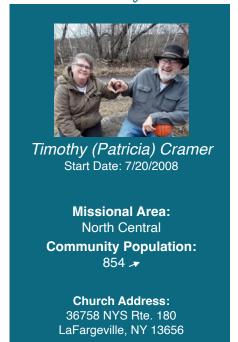
The best part of this ministry has been the conversations we have had the opportunity to have. As we gather around the table, we are not so different than our neighbors and God continues to open doors. Names are being learned. Questions are being asked. We have had the opportunity to celebrate birthdays, while also holding space for difficult life circumstances. Many of those who walk through our door would not come to church on a Sunday morning, yet they join us for dinner on a weekly basis. 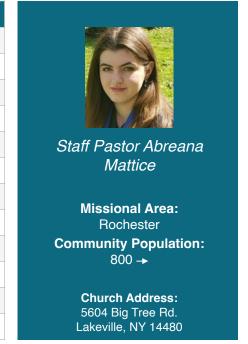

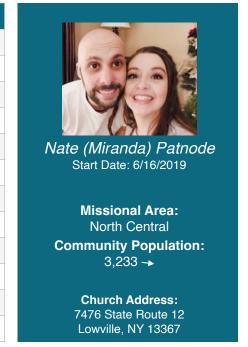

I am pleased to offer my second report to the Upstate New York District Assembly as the Senior Pastor of the Church of the Nazarene in Plattsburgh. I am honored to pastor a church with a 100+ year legacy of ministry in this community of the North Country!

We have been basking in God's glory and sharing in God's goodness and many blessings! In June, we re-started our Faith-in-Action Sunday. Rather than meeting for our typical Sunday worship service, we organized service projects in our church and community. Our October Trunk-or-Treat event brought hundreds of neighborhood individuals through our church parking lot. We continued to partner with our local Salvation Army by collecting food for its annual community Thanksgiving dinner, and toys for its Angel Tree ministry to help children and families during Christmas time. Our weekly Thursday night basketball ministry welcomes 15–30 individuals from our neighborhood. These participants often bring their friends and family to watch the games. Not only did they decide to raise funds for new basketball hoops as a way to give back to the church, but they also partnered with us and the local Salvation Army in the Angel Tree Ministry. Finally, we continue to help students at SUNY Plattsburgh through our weekly donations to the Cardinal Cupboard. This service of the University assists students with food and tangible items that they otherwise cannot obtain. It is a blessing for our church to be one of the largest sources of donations for this important and valuable service.

We are pleased to announce that we have started two new ministries. We started a young adult fellowship group on Saturday nights, and we organized a Women's ministry that features a monthly breakfast, occasional activities, and we hosted a one-day women's retreat in October featuring clergy from our district.

What was most exciting of all this past year was the full sanctuary for our Christmas Eve service, our July Baptism service where I had the privilege of baptizing 6 individuals—5 of whom were under the age of 17, and the taking in of 13 new members! Following their membership classes, these 13 individuals all decided they wanted to continue learning from each other, so they formed their own small group!

As I reflect on this last year, I am thankful for the ways God has been at work in our church. We continue to see new people attending, and this year, we have seen more of them stay and become more engaged in our church community—even becoming members! Our youth group has been experiencing exciting spiritual growth, and a number of our students are intentionally making decisions to make room for God in their daily lives. It is fun to see adults being inspired by our young people! Our children's ministry has gone through a season of transition but has come out the other side with some encouraging signs of growth and stability. We are excited about what may be ahead for them!

Two things happened this year that help illustrate the work God is doing. We came into the 2024 fiscal year with a significant financial surplus. The trend for a while was the opposite of this, so this came at a good time for us as we needed to do some reinvesting in our building. Believing that God is doing a new thing at Calvary, we wanted our space to be illustrative of this new work. So, we underwent a summer-long space renewal project that resulted in most of our older sections being repainted, recarpeted, and refreshed. We also wanted to be better about communicating who we are from the front door to the sanctuary, so we added new signage and design features to try to help our visitors get a sense of who we are before they even worshipped with us.

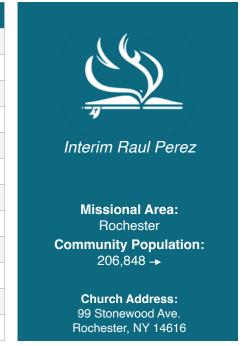
Bringing new life to our space also allowed us to change how we use some of our space. Two significant shifts happened. We moved our teen ministry to the opposite side of our building, and their old space was renovated to become our new food pantry. This last year, we gave out 57 tons of food to over 2200 households. All of this had been done from a tiny room in our church with the help of 96 different volunteers! Our shifting of space now means we have a small market-style food pantry, which allows individuals to shop our shelves for themselves. The upside to this approach is that it offers more dignity to our guests, reduces food waste, and gets them from our parking lot into our actual church building. We are excited to see how God is going to grow this ministry and the bridge between our food pantry and our sanctuary. Our desire is for our friends to experience the fullness of God's grace—body and spirit!

We've done a lot of work trying to get ready for the new thing God wants to do in our church, and this has come at a good point for us. This year, Calvary Community celebrates its 100th year! We are hoping and praying that the decisions we've made this last year will set us on a path of seeing more lives transformed by God. We are entering our second century of ministry, thankful for those who have gone before us, and excited for what God is doing and will do in the future.

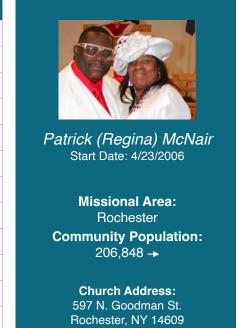

We are thrilled to submit our first report as co-lead pastors at Rochester Grace. We arrived in June 2024, and have enjoyed getting to know the people of Grace, the communities surrounding us, and the beauty of Upstate New York. We are incredibly thankful for the leadership of the church board, interim Pastor Jack Connell, and Pastor Laura, Pastor Mark, and Pastor Tom in the time of pastoral transition.

The people of Grace Church of the Nazarene experienced several deep losses in the months just prior to us getting here, as well as since we arrived. As a church body, we have spent a lot of time grieving with one another, supporting each other, and reflecting on and sharing about the faithfulness of God even and especially through the storms.

We are excited about the ways that Grace Church loves the community we are placed in. Many have been happening for years, including community events such as Trunk-or-Treat, Community Fun Day, Easter Eggstravaganza, and our Food Pantry which serves many local families throughout each month.

We have also developed new connections with several local elementary schools. We had the opportunity to supply Kleenex, wipes, crayons, and some used clothing for when kids need them. We also had an angel tree to provide gifts for a struggling family from one of the schools, and other families in our community. During National School Counselors Week, we sent a card and gift card to each school's counselors, which were very appreciated by those counselors who work so hard each day. We recently started stocking a shelf in the Religion & Philosophy building at Roberts Wesleyan University with snacks, games, and other fun things for students. It's been wonderful to meet students and faculty each time we go to replenish supplies. We recently had a winter clothing drive and collected many bags of coats and other cold-weather items to give to Cross of Christ Deliverance Temple for them to hand out to those they encounter in need of warmth.

In November, we hosted a Thanksgiving Day Dinner for anyone who needed a place to gather or needed food. We had about 25 in attendance, which included some from Grace Church, some from the community, and 9 refugees we connected with through World Relief. Several community members also reached out to volunteer and helped to prepare and serve the meal. The people of Grace Church provided a lot of home-cooked food to serve; it was a beautiful time together. Since then, we have formed a small group of people who are volunteering with World Relief to serve as a Good Neighbor Team to care directly for a refugee family and welcome them. It's wonderful to see the many amazing ways this church loves the community.

Some may remember Crossroads Youth Center, which reached many teens in our area beginning in the 1990s. The building (The Barn) has been mostly unused for the past few years. We have begun some remodeling and are seeking funding to do further work as we seek to provide a third space in our community. Future dreams include a cafe, tutoring, community classes, indoor playspace, work space, and more. We are praying intently for God's vision and provision for all the property here at Grace, that it can be used to glorify God and bring God's Kingdom here on earth.

It is an honor to be giving my seventh annual report for Schenectady Church of the Nazarene. The experiences, ministry, and growth over the past year has been one of the most beautiful spiritual endeavors I've had the privilege of being a part of. Lives have been changed, new people have stepped into leadership roles, five people have accepted and made a commitment to Christ and we are continuing to move forward as the body of Christ!

We continued our ministry with Northern Rivers and Paige Elementary School. We attended and hosted events. This ministry is now referred to as O.N.E. (Outreach Neighborhood Enrichment). There is a long list of activities that we did with each of these community partners but I would like to emphasize something bigger than the activities. Relationships are being formed between our church body and these community partners. This ministry isn't any specific shape, it changes and morphs from season to season, depending on need, activities, and people. Its shapelessness is what allows us to creatively fill in the gaps and show up as a loving community partner. We are seeing the changes in our neighborhood of people knowing each other and being known!

Last year we collaborated together on something I felt we were being called to which was creating a children's ministry. At the time we had one family with one child under the age of two. So, this was definitely a huge step of faith the church was willing to take! We remodeled a room to become the Children's Church room and held our first VBS in a very long time. The first night was difficult with no children in attendance, however, we pushed through and had the adults engaged in children's worship and God was so faithful. In total, we had 8 kids attend VBS last year with 16 background checked adult volunteers. Now, we have two more families attending our church with four more kids. Through this process five people (3 adults, 2 children) confessed Christ as their Savior! It was a very beautiful day of celebration on VBS Sunday!

So what's next? As we continue to do all that we have been doing, there is a new project on the horizon. We have been ministering to our neighbors, to our community partners, to one another; now we are sensing a call to create a welcoming community space on our property. We will be building a community pavilion in the side yard, something we have dreamed about for a while. It has been determined that it will likely be a project that is done in several stages. This will be a pavilion that the community can rent (for a nominal fee that will go towards maintenance of the pavilion and surrounding it). We will also be holding our annual community cookout, outside worship services, enjoy meals together in the warmer months, and can be used for events like Trunk or Treat, VBS, Father's Day cookout, Graduation Sunday, and more.

God has been so faithful to this church. And watching this church be faithful to God has shaped me deeply as a pastor and as a follower of Christ. They love God and others so very well; it is a privilege to lead them and serve alongside them in this space that God has carved out for us to live life together here in Schenectady.

We went out and served our community by volunteering at the local food pantry, passing out BBQ dinners at the annual town gala, and providing a bounce house and dunk tank for the town fall festival.

Prayer and giving have always been two strengths of the church in Springwater. We look forward to growing deeper in our strengths in how we pray for and bless our community.

God has proven Himself faithful in the lives of His people, continues to bless His church and this community, and we give Him praise!

In the last worship service of 2024, our church gathered for a time of worship and praise. We listened to some powerful testimonies. Then, an inspiring few minutes took place. A particular example of this being in Joshua chapter 4. After God parted the river Jordan for the Israelites to cross it, together they built an altar of 12 stones, one for each tribe.

People from all across our sanctuary came up to lay a stone down at the altar. For some, the stone represented a prayer request. For others, the stone represented an answer to prayer. Minutes later, you could see stones neatly laid all across the altar. It was evidence of God's faithfulness.

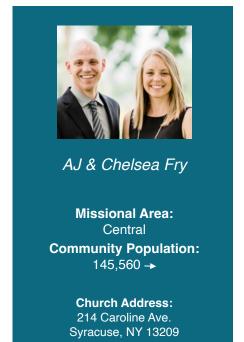
Despite some of the challenges we have faced this year, we see evidence of God's faithfulness.

- 28 people gave their life to Christ this past year
- 5 new members

- We are partnering with a number of groups that align with our mission including:
 - Camillus Middle School (to feed kids in meals over the weekends)
 - · Vineyard Church (to develop leaders in our community through the Global Leadership Summit)
 - Prison Ministry (an initiative to share God's love in local prisons)
 - Ononadaga Road Elementary School (assisting them with a function to foster greater community with young families)
 - Syracuse Shalom
 - · Northside Community Church of the Nazarene
- We have begun an initiative to grow younger as a church. We have taken a couple steps so far: First, we had a meeting with our young people over a meal and asked them some questions to begin hearing their hearts. Second, we had a meeting with our older people to convey value to them and help them talk through their feelings about our church growing younger. We are working on the next steps now.
- During our Inspiring Hope Campaign we did in the fall, we sent off 84 shoeboxes for Operation
- Christmas Child, packed 11 meals for people in need during Thanksgiving, and set aside \$130 for our benevolence fund to help people who come to us year-round with various needs.
- We hosted Aspire which is a women's conference last November and saw a number of ladies come and be blessed.
- We raised \$42,735 to pay down our mortgage

Reflecting back on this year, God has been faithful to us. Our altar is a representation of that. Let's keep inspiring our community with hope through the love of Christ!

Sunday services are always blessed, and in spite of the fact of the absence of live music, worshipping is real, meaningful and up lifting. In one of those services, two children and one teenager from the same family, accepted Jesus as their savior. Their parents explained to us that they never told their children to do that that morning, that they just responded themselves to the invitation. How wonderful is to see how the Holy Spirit work in our lives.

Last year the church organized and promoted several activities to make their presence within the community, this included a Thanksgiving community dinner and a Friday Night movie at the church. The efforts to start a Spanish speaking group in the church has been very difficult, for the simple reason of the instability of the immigrant / migrant population of the area. Still, we continue to visit, pray and keep in touch with some of them and assisting them. Twice last year the church opened its doors for long hours workshop for migrant workers presented by support organizations of the area.

The church continues to prepare financially for the calling a permanent pastor. In conjunction with the district, a plan is already in place to repair the church's parsonage, looking to complete the work during the Spring and Summer times.

We want to take this opportunity to give thanks to pastors AJ and Chelsea Fry for taking over the responsibility of preaching on Sunday. We continue to assist the Wolcott church, conducting board meeting and fulfilling pastoral work as needed.

We ask for your prayers for this beautiful community of believers, as they themselves seek the Lord's will for the church.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

FEBRUARY 28, 2025

NOTE 1 - Significant Accounting Policies:

(A) Nature of Operations:

Upstate New York District Church of the Nazarene (the District), a not-for-profit corporation, operates to respond to the Great Commission of Christ, to go and make disciples of all nations. As part of this mission, the District provides financial support to start-up Churches.

(B) Basis of Presentation:

The accompanying financial statements have been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting in accordance with U.S. Generally Accepted Principles (US GAAP). The District operates on a fiscal year, ending on the last day of February. 2024 was a "leap year" so the last day of February was the 29th. For convenience, the dating of the accompanying financial statements and notes are labeled February 28th rather than the actual year end dates.

The District currently has two funds established to carry on specific activities. The Funds activities and their allocations are at the discretion of the District's Board.

<u>General Fund</u> – For the running of the day to day operations of the District.

Missional Fund – For assistance and future expansion growth of local churches.

(C) Cash and Cash Equivalents:

The District considers all bank accounts and all highly liquid instruments with a maturity of six months or less to be cash equivalents.

(D) Investments Valuation and Income Recognition:

The District follows SFAS No. 124, Accounting for Certain Investments Held by Not-For-Profit Organizations. Under SFAS No. 124, investments in marketable securities with readily determinable fair values and all investments in debt securities except for Fixed Annuity Contracts are required to be reported at their fair values in the statement of financial position (See Note 3). Contract value (See Note 4), is the relevant measure for Fixed Annuity Contacts because contract value is the amount the District normally would receive on the contract.

Investment income or loss (including realized and unrealized gains and losses on investments, interest and dividends) is included in the statement of activities as increases or decreases in fund balance.

(E) Accounts Receivable and Credit Losses:

Accounts receivable consists of money owed to the District from local church budget payments, rents, property sales or assets transferred to District, where payments or funds have not been received by the District at year-end.

Accounts Receivable at February 28, 2023 was \$52,245.

The District estimates credit losses using historical experience, current financial conditions, and datadriven forecasts of conditions affecting the collectability of reported amounts. Each year, the District evaluates whether adjustments to these estimates are necessary as additional relevant information becomes available.

Management does not believe any conditions exist which will adversely affect future collectability of these receivables. As a result, the District believes that there is no significant credit risk associated with these accounts. The estimated credit loss was immaterial in for all years presented.

(F) Property and Equipment:

Property and equipment are recorded at cost and are being depreciated by the straight-line method over the estimated useful lives of assets as follows:

The District has adopted a policy to expense all individual items with a unit cost of \$1,000 or less, regardless of the useful life.

(G) Tax Status:

The District is exempt from Federal income tax under provisions Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code as a religious organization and under similar statutes of New York State Law. In most circumstances these positions would be open to Internal Revenue Service audit for fiscal years ending after February 28, 2022.

(H) Estimates:

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with U.S. generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect reported amounts and disclosures. Accordingly, actual results could differ from those estimated.

(I) Revenue Recognition:

The District follows Accounting Standards Update ("ASU") 2014-09, Revenue from Contracts with Customers (Topic 606) and ASU 2018-08, Not-For-Profit Entities: Clarifying the Scope of the Accounting Guidance for Contributions Received and Contributions Made.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS (CONTINUED)

FEBRUARY 28, 2025

NOTE 1 - Significant Accounting Policies (Continued):

(I) Revenue Recognition (Continued):

ASU 2014-09 establishes a new contract and control-based revenue recognition model, changes the basis for deciding whether revenue is recognized over time or at a point in time, and expands revenue-related disclosures.

ASU 2018-08 assists entities in evaluating whether transactions should be accounted for as contributions or exchange transactions and determining whether a transaction is conditional.

The District recognizes revenue from local church budget and rental payments. The performance obligation of providing administrative services and building facilities is recognized on a monthly basis.

Proceeds from sales of church property whether owned by the District or transferred to the District are recognized in the year the sale was completed.

General church grants are recorded as either with or without donor restrictions depending on the existence of any donor-imposed conditions or use.

(J) Date of Management's Review of Subsequent Event:

Subsequent events were evaluated through May 14, 2025 which is the date the financial statements were available to be issued. There were no subsequent events requiring recording or disclosure in the financial statements.

NOTE 2 - Investment Income:

Investment income includes the net unrealized appreciation (depreciation) in the fair value of the investments, the realized gains (losses) on investments sold during the year, dividends and/or interest reinvested during the year and investment fees. These numbers are netted to reflect that the dividends reinvested are part of the total return on investment.

Investment income includes interest credited to contract value investments.

NOTE 3 - Fair Value Measurement:

In accordance with generally accepted accounting principles, the District established a hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs used to measure fair value. The hierarchy consists of three levels as described below:

NOTE 3 - Fair Value Measurement (Continued):

- Level 1 inputs consist of unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets and have the highest priority.
- Level 2 inputs consist of observable inputs other than quoted prices for the identical assets.
- Level 3 inputs consist of unobservable inputs and is used only when Level 1 and Level 2 inputs are unavailable. Level 3 inputs have the lowest priority.

The District's investments consist of Level 1 inputs and there are no investments requiring Level 2 or Level 3 inputs. The following is a description of the District's Level 1 input valuation methodology used for investments measured at fair value. There have been no changes in methodology at February 28, 2025 and 2024.

Mutual Funds - Are based on quoted net asset values of the shares held by the District at year-end.

NOTE 4 - Investments at Contract Value:

The District entered into a Secure Term Choice Fixed Annuity Contract with New York Life Insurance Company. As described in Note 1(D), Contract Value is the relevant value because that is the amount the District would receive under the Contract. The Contract Value is equal to the accumulated cash contributions and interest credited to the contract, less any withdrawals.

The guaranteed rate of interest credited to the District for 2025 was 4.35%.

NOTE 5 - Mortgages Receivable:

The District holds a mortgage on property sold to an unrelated third party. At February 28, 2025 and 2024, the balance outstanding was \$16,779 and \$19,883, respectively.

NOTE 6 - Retirement Plan:

There is a specifically designed, IRS-qualified group 403(b) Saving Retirement Plan offered by the Nazarene Benefits Fund (NB USA).

The Group Plan covers lay ministerial employees of the Nazarene churches, agencies, evangelist and registered chaplains.

Eligible employees can make traditional pre-tax salary deferrals into their own accounts. Contributions are immediately 100% vested, no matter their source.

NB USA can also make Annual Pension Supplements (APS) payments directly to eligible employees 403(b) accounts. This contribution is based on their elected deferrals and contributions made to the group NB USA Fund by the District.

NOTE 7 - Concentrations:

At various times during the year the account balances of the District exceed FDIC coverage at the banking institutions the District uses.

Substantially all revenues received are from the District's Local Churches.

NOTE 8 - Contingencies:

Church Mortgages:

The District is contingently liable for certain debts incurred by local churches in the event they are unable to fulfill their obligations. Currently there are five local churches that have incurred such debt. The Debts are secured by real estate owned by the local churches. Should a local church default on its payment, the District would make payments on the debt until the church is financially able to resume payment without the District's assistance. The total contingent liability for such debts was approximately \$1,200,000 at February 28, 2025.

If the local church is closed then all assets, including real estate, are transferred to the District to be sold.

NOTE 9 - Legal Proceedings:

In the ordinary course of business, the District engages its legal counsel to defend it against actions whether asserted or anticipated as the District judge necessary in the circumstances.

The District does not believe that any of those actions are either not covered by insurance or would materially effect its operations or financial position.

The District maintains a policy of structuring its financial assets to be available as its general expenditures, liabilities, and other obligations come due.

NOTE 11 - Prior Year Presentation:

The accompanying financial statements are presented in two-year comparative form. Minor reclassifications of prior period balances underlying the assets, liabilities, revenues, expenses, and cash flows presented have been made. These reclassifications have no net effect on any period presented.
